


Mum

Read about parent-child relationships on social media.

Social networks are for more convenient connections, rather than for more difficult communication. Surveys show that 55 percent of parents use social media to spy on their children. However, 30 percent of teens do not agree to friend their parents. Here are the voices from both sides.

Children's voice

Opinion 1:

Mum told me not to share too much about my personal life. I can't post freely with Mum reading. It's better to talk with her in real life. I'll tell her what I want her to know. But such relationships with parents brought us closer, like never before.

Opinion 2:

My mum always shares health tips or meaningless inspiring stories, so I blocked her recently. Yesterday, she asked me why Dad could read my recent posts but she hadn't seen any for a long time. I said there was a problem with her phone. And then I secretly unblocked her.

Parents' voice

Opinion 1:

I followed my daughter on WeChat using a fake account. I learned more about her. And I even followed her idol, a pop singer. I bought her two concert tickets to see that singer as a birthday gift. And she got wildly happy about that.

Opinion 2:

It's OK if my son blocks me. The more I dig into his secrets, the deeper he'll bury them. Everybody has his or her secrets. Parents also have things they keep from their kids. We all need private space.

Some young people try to balance protecting their privacy and their parents' feelings by creating two accounts—one for family and the other for friends. Does it work? And what would you do?



"Tiger Mum" on social networks




