Presentation

Say a few words about your school.

Example:

I'm a student of Jianghe University. It's located in the eastern part of Wuhan city. We've got a beautiful campus, with many trees and flowers. Our university isn't very big, but there are good teachers. I'm a freshman here. I've been here only about two weeks, but I've already fallen in love with this place where I'm going to live and study in the next four years.



Pair work

You are new students who have just arrived at campus. Ask each other questions that are of interest to you.

Examples:

- You are a new student here, aren't you?
- What's your name?
- Where do you come from?



- When did you get here?
- Have you been to this city before?
- How did you come, by plane or train?
- How long did it take you to get here?
- How was your journey?



Chen Chen: Excuse me, can you tell me where Building 3 is?

Hu Hai: The girls' dorm? Follow this road and turn left at the first intersection. You'll see the building on your right.

Chen Chen: Thank you very much!

Hu Hai: Guess you're a freshman, aren't you?

Chen Chen: Yeah, I'm Chen Chen from Yunnan. I'm in the Foreign Languages Department.

Hu Hai: How do you do? I'm Hu Hai from Jiangsu. I'm also a freshman, in the Chinese Department. I arrived yesterday. Since then I've spent a lot of time walking around here.

Chen Chen: No wonder you know the campus so well. Nice to meet you!

Hu Hai: (Looks at Chen Chen's luggage) Do you need a hand?

Chen Chen: No, thanks. I can manage by myself.

Hu Hai: See you around then.

Chen Chen: Bye.

Group work

Do you still remember your first day at college?

Role play

Work in pairs. Student A has just arrived at college, whereas student B arrived a few days earlier. A wants to know from B where he/she is supposed to have his/her meals. B tells A that there are quite a few choices. They introduce themselves and decide to go and eat together.



Li Xin: Room 314... This is it. (*Knocks at the door*) May I come in?

Chen Jin: Yes, come on in!

Li Xin: Hi, I'm Li Xin from Henan. I believe we're going to be roommates.

Chen Jin: Welcome. How do you do? I'm Chen Jin from Fujian.

Li Xin: How do you do? Where are the other two? There are four of us, right?

Chen Jin: Yes. I don't know where they are. I haven't met them yet. They may not have arrived.

Actually, I arrived only two hours ago myself.

Li Xin: Which bed is mine?

Chen Jin: Which one do you prefer?

Li Xin: Any one will do. Makes no difference to me.

Group work

Role play

Study the following patterns

When you share a room with others, you often need to ask for their permission or help to do certain things. How can you make requests politely? Here are some expressions you might use:

Asking for permission	Responding
May/Can I open the window?	Yes, please do! Yes, of course. Sure. Go ahead.
Do you mind if I open the window? Do you mind my opening the window?	Not at all. Certainly not. Of course not.

Asking for help	Responding
Will you please open the window? Can/Could you open the window? Do/Would you mind opening the window?	Okay. Sure. All right. With pleasure. (formal) I'd rather not if you don't mind. It's terribly cold.



Role play

- **Situation 2:** You want to turn on the TV to watch a basketball game, and your roommate readily agrees, because he/she is also interested in the game.

- **Situation 4:** You ask your roommate, who is sitting by the window, to open it, but he/she says he/she would rather not because it's noisy outside, and he/she is trying to do some serious writing.

Group work
