
The nuclear family (核心家庭) is a characteristic of American families.

A nuclear family refers to a family group. It consists only of a husband, a wife and children. It is rare that parents live together with their children who have got married. Relatives, such as grandparents, uncles, aunts, cousins and in-laws, usually live separately. This family structure is the so-called "nuclear family".

A nuclear family is contrasted with an extended family or a joint family (大家庭), in which there could be many generations living together.
